Collective nouns **represent groups** of people, animals or things.

- The hitchhikers were attacked by a **swarm of bees**.
- The **bunch of keys** belongs to me.
- The police have arrested the whole **gang of robbers**.

Abstract nouns are words that **represent a quality or an idea**.

- The principal explained the **importance** of **punctuality**.
- The students respect their teacher for her **patience** and **dedication**.
